Nurturing a strong sense of community shapes the heart of the COM experience, and perhaps nowhere is that more evident than in Dr. Helen Castellanos Brewer's world.



s the new vice president for student services at College of the Mainland, Brewer is passionate about providing an exceptional student experience. She works diligently to advocate on behalf of students – whether that's addressing equity issues or changing students' perspective of higher education – to ensure that every student is equipped with the necessary resources and support to navigate their unique road to success.

And for many community college students, that road can be paved with unexpected challenges along the way, all too often making it difficult for them to achieve their educational goals.

That's where Dr. Brewer steps in.

"My job is to make sure I am helping to address outcomes in terms of graduation and retention," Brewer said. "It's vital to help students accomplish their goals, and if we don't do that, then I'm not doing my job."

While those are sound words from a seasoned leader with many years of higher education experience under her belt, Brewer's own story did not come without its share of twists and turns along the way.



FORCE FOR POSITIVE CHANGE

Brewer's journey began after her parents immigrated to the United States from Guatemala in the 1970s. Proud of her humble beginnings, she was raised in Maryland with two younger siblings whom she also helped rear. Serving as a translator for her Spanish-speaking parents, she quickly grew to find strength in learning to bridge the gap between her two worlds.

"Sometimes people feel sorry for you when you're in those roles, but I find they help you develop the strength to persevere through very challenging times," she said.

Attending an all-girls Catholic school as a teenager proved to be guite the transformative experience when she found herself immersed in

a school community where her higher education aspirations were nurtured in a deep and meaningful way.

Though the experience was impactful, the transition to college did not come easy for her as a child of immigrants and first-generation college student. So, she set off to find the path that was right for her.


"At 17 years old, I was trying to see how to go to college and how we are going to pay for it," Brewer explained.

That's when she decided to attend community college. And she'll tell you that the experience did not come without its own set of challenges.

"As a first-generation college student who was working to pay for college, you don't feel as though you're in an environment that's familiar, and you don't realize that there is a support system in place," she said.

But after transferring to the University of Maryland to earn her bachelor's degree, she was inspired to start the first Latina sorority in the state – a bold step to provide a safe, inclusive space so that students like her could feel pride in their culture and be in community with each other.

That experience was one of many that helped shape her into the leader she is today. After going on to complete her postgraduate studies, her innate sense of awareness soon gained clarity. And it is through this lens that allows her to be more culturally conscious and better connect with the unique needs of COM students.



"I understand that many of our students live in

throughout the years. Ultimately, she embraced that skill because she personally understands education's profound and widespread impact.

"It changed my social and socioeconomic trajectory – not only for me, but for my family," Brewer said. "I wanted to work in higher education to make changes for other people and their families."

And those changes are abundant.

At COM, she strives to improve student support systems in a more intentional way to address challenges that affect minority students. She is currently studying this through the Aspen Rising Presidents Fellowship, a highly selective leadership program preparing the next generation of community college presidents to transform institutions to achieve higher and more equitable levels of student success.

The opportunity allows her to bring new insight to College of the Mainland.

> 'My goal is to look at a broader picture of how all the services connect to one another and making sure we are aligning what we do here with high-impact practices happening nationally," Brewer said.

It's through her innovative and holistic approach to higher learning that those changes are evident. From improving access to virtual student services to creating a more personalized approach for new students with enrollment coaches, Brewer leads with a sharp focus on embracing the strength of the COM community to foster an engaging and personalized student experience.

"The more you get the community involved in making changes, the more likely students are to be successful," she said.

From alleviating financial barriers to helping students navigate their higher education journey as a first-generation college student, Brewer's role as the vice president for student services is a personal one for her – one where her own story comes full circle.



Reflecting back on her journey, she has a message for students who may be considering higher education but are nervous to explore what that road may entail.

"Education, regardless of where you are socioeconomically, is one thing that people can never take away from you. And it is unequivocally the most life-changing pursuit that you can ever partake in. It's a time for exploring who you are. If you just don't quit and if you just keep going, the reward will outweigh all of the sacrifices that you need to make - not only for yourself but for your family too."

Since joining College of the Mainland last year, Molnar has thoroughly enjoyed helping students navigate the process of getting started at college.

"I love the culture. I love the community. I love the people that I work with, and I love the students that I serve," she said.

For Molnar, this passion for COM exudes in her work where she helps students shape their educational goals along their new journey. She administers career assessments, helps students navigate financial aid, assists with the college application process and shares various career resources — all in the hopes of empowering students to make informed academic decisions that will lead them toward a rewarding future.

"If you're thinking about college, come talk to us because we want to make sure you're making a well-informed decision about what you're going to enter into," she said.

As a new member of the COM family, Molnar enjoys exploring her community and connecting with new and prospective students. And those students run the gamut.

From high school students looking for an early college start to adult learners wanting to make a career change or diversify their skill set, she enjoys helping tailor the COM experience to each student's individual needs.

It was during her studies at Baylor University where she learned the impact that meaningful connections can have on transforming a student's higher educational experience. While she graduated with her bachelor's degree in education, she started out as a medical humanities major because she had always been told she would make a great doctor. But after digging a little deeper, she realized she had a different calling.

"When I realized it wasn't necessarily for me, I went to see a career specialist because I wanted to explore other options," she recalled.

As a first-generation college student, Molnar felt apprehensive about that meeting. "I was nervous to show her that I didn't know what I was doing," she explained.

But after taking a career assessment, her counselor took the time to review the results with her. This conversation helped her find a career and major that best fit her interests.

"The more that we know about ourselves, the more we can advocate for ourselves and pursue things we are interested in," she said.

After defining her pathway, Molnar realized she most enjoyed being able to connect with students to figure out where their interests and passions lie. Therefore, joining the Student Services team was a natural fit for her.

"We understand that personal connection is a deep one," she said. "Having students visit us to make sure they're successful is something we're hoping to achieve here."

At COM, where more than 60% of students are first-generation college students, Molnar is able to personally relate to the students she serves.

"Maybe students face an obstacle that you yourself faced or maybe it's not the same challenge, but it's something you can still empathize with," she said.

It is through these meaningful connections that Molnar believes College of the Mainland is a special place where students can really feel at home.

"It is such a caring community," she said. "Our small classes allow our students to really connect with our faculty and be successful."

Outside the classroom, Molnar says that students can also build one-on-one connections with their enrollment coach and academic adviser, which might not be easy to do at other colleges.

"Knowing that you are not a number, that you are a person and that we care about you really illustrates our values here at COM," she said.

Ultimately, Molnar wants potential students to know that they do belong in college and that she and her team are there to support them every step of the way.

"As a part of the COM community, we want to ensure that you are plugged into the resources that will help you throughout your time here, personally and professionally," she said. "We'll guide you in any way we can because we want you to succeed. We want you to flourish. We want you to thrive."

"The HVAC world really piqued my interest. The HVAC world Is not simple. It is very complex. There's a lot of parts to it but for me that's so rewarding. It's not the same thing every day. You have to have a good knowledge of a lot of things. It's a very diverse field, and that really appealed to me."

"I would absolutely recommend the HVAC program at COM. They're not just somebody who came out of the industry 20 years ago. They are still in it. They understand, and they're really good about walking you through scenarios."

COM's Heating, Ventilation and Air-Conditioning (HVAC) program prepares students for a successful career as an HVAC technician and/or installer through hands-on training. HVAC technicians work with systems in commercial offices, industrial complexes, manufacturing plants, schools, hospitals, hotels, restaurants, construction and residential homes.

After moving to Texas due to social, economic, and political tensions in his home country, Jose Lopez now looks forward to maximizing his educational opportunities at COM. After completing the English as a Second Language (ESL) program at COM, he dual enrolled in a workforce program while simultaneously completing his High School Equivalency (HSE).

"The good thing about being enrolled in two programs at the same time is that you can do it faster. After I finish my certificate, I would like to get an associate in drafting. After that, I would like to transfer to a university to study architecture. For me, in order to do that, I need a GED certificate. I'm looking forward to the opportunity to study, get a bachelor's degree and get a good job."

COM's Adult Education programs are designed to prepare individuals 16 and older to take their High School Equivalency (HSE) and/or English as a Second Language (ESL) exams. And best of all, with our Career Pathways program, students can enroll in one of a select offering of workforce programs while concurrently enrolled in the HSE or ESL program.

INDUSTRIAL CAREERS BUILDING

Occupational Safety and Health Technology (OSHT)

The new facility will give the OSHT program the needed opportunity to incorporate adequate space for a conducive learning environment, extra storage and a demonstration space for hands-on equipment



and tools for our students. These added resources allow students to practice and acquire the necessary technical skills required in the job market. In addition, the space will feature a new mini resource center for students needing textbooks and other materials.

Process Technology (PTEC)

PTEC students will receive top-of-the-line training in a new Glycol Separation Unit. The unit allows students to become familiar with the day-to-day tasks of a process operator. Also featuring state-of-the-art static and working labs, the new PTEC learning environment will house up-to-date working process simulators and static models. By working with the equipment in the labs, students gain a better understanding of the process operator practices and procedures. Students will also be provided with a state-of-the-art tutoring center.

Heating, Ventilation and Air-Conditioning (HVAC)

The HVAC classroom and lab is a long-term growth strategy that will provide an innovative, collaborative, hands-on learning space to prepare students for in-demand, high-growth careers. Allowing for larger cohorts and the addition of a refrigeration credential, the new space will offer a comprehensive interactive multimedia learning curriculum and state-of-the-art trainers for teaching hands-on skills.
