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College of the Mainland is a learning-centered, comprehensive community college dedicated to student success and the intellectual and economic prosperity of the diverse communities we serve.

The college district includes Texas City, Dickinson, Bacliff and San Leon.



The COM story is a story of service when our Police Academy program launched in 1969 at the behest of Texas City Police Chief Rankin Dewalt. Since then, nearly 1,800 cadets have graduated from the program ready to serve, protect and make the communities around us a safer place to live and work.

It is a story of innovation when 55 students walked into a College of the Mainland classroom and made history in 1994 as the first class to work toward an Associate of Applied Science degree in Process Technology (PTEC). That not only began the first PTEC degree at COM but the first of its kind in the nation.

It too is a story of progress when our community rallied together to overwhelmingly support the historic 2018 bond measure in an effort to maintain pace with the rapid growth of Galveston County. And since the completion of this first phase of COM's long-range plan, on time and on budget, our campus has undergone a major facelift that allowed for a new trajectory to be established.

While these moments each leave their own unique imprint on COM's story, together they paint a bigger picture of the renewed spirit of the College of the Mainland learning experience.

But the COM story doesn't stop here.

As so many of our neighbors have seen the very landscape of our college campus rapidly transform in recent years, I'm often asked, "What's next for College of the Mainland?" In order to answer that question, I must first ask myself, what's now?



A COMMUNITY'S INVESTMENT BREATHES LIFE INTO A RISING LEADER Back in 2012, DeAndre' Knoxson was a bright-eyed College of the Mainland student who could regularly be found seated in a Process Technology (PTEC) classroom, eager to learn and ready to make the community around him a better place. Now, you'll find him in a seat of a different kind – at the dais of the council chambers as one of Texas City's newest commissioners.

Growing up the oldest of nine siblings in public housing on the south side of Texas City, Knoxson's journey from pupil to politician was definitely not an easy one. "I know how it feels not to have everything," he recalled.

But he defied the odds by becoming a first-generation college graduate who now holds a seat in one of the most powerful positions in his community as the Texas City Commissioner of District 1. For him, knowing that the watchful eyes of his siblings were upon him pushed him to want better not only for himself but for those coming after him.

"It doesn't matter where you come from," Knoxson said. "It's where you're going."

Knoxson's leadership potential and innate ambition were apparent at an early age. As a Texas City High School student, he was a constant fixture in a variety of leadership development and extracurricular activities including his local Juneteenth committee, student council, football, track and field, and swimming. It was here that he realized the importance of community engagement and was introduced to a strong network of community leaders who guided him along the way.

"Outside of my parents doing a great job raising me, I had great community leaders – individuals who actually gave back and showed that they cared about us," DeAndre' recounts. "There are so many different paths that I could have gone down, but I didn't. So, I really thank them for that."

It was this desire to forge his own purposeful path in his community that led Knoxson to pursue a career as a process operator, a field fueled by the region's thriving petrochemical industry.

Recognizing the longstanding and impressive reputation of the PTEC program, he knew that College of the Mainland was the perfect fit for him.

"I remember I was hooked after the first Intro to Process Technology class," Knoxson said.

He credits the COM PTEC program for preparing

him to work in the field through hands-on labs and classroom instruction. Here, he trained alongside industry professionals which allowed him to ultimately transition into the rewarding career path that he loves today.

"We have professionals who know what it's like to do shiftwork, turn the valves and work the board," Knoxson said. "We also have a Glycol Separation Unit (GSU), so we get a good sense of what it's like to work in the industry."

Upon earning his Associate of Applied Science in Process Technology in 2015, he worked briefly in banking before deciding to return to his PTEC roots to now work as a process operator at LyondellBasell.

Never one to stop learning, he later returned to COM to pursue a second degree in general studies – an intentional choice to prepare him for university transfer where he could pursue his bachelor's degree.

While at COM, he took full advantage of many opportunities to maximize his leadership potential by serving as a team captain for intramural flag football, Process Technology Club treasurer and secretary, and Minority Men for Excellence president.


"Being the president helped me sharpen my skills as a leader," Knoxson said. "I felt an obligation to complete my degree to show the club that perseverance pays off."

Earning his second degree from COM in 2022 was only one of many accomplishments for the COM alum. When he was 19, Knoxson started the Sting-to-Sting Scholarship for Texas City High School students and is also one of the youngest people to be appointed to the Housing Authority of the City of Texas City. Most recently, he was selected as one of Galveston Daily News' 40 Under 40 honorees, an accolade he was not expecting, but is still very proud of.

"It was an incredible moment for me because the things I have been doing haven't gone unnoticed," he said.

And while his accomplishments are vast, for Knoxson, the real work has only just begun. Since being elected as a commissioner last year, he has hit the ground running and is committed to continue paying it forward like his own mentors who came before him.

"I just want to do my part now," Knoxson said. "I truly care about this community. I grew up here. I currently still live here. This is my home. I really want to make a difference here."



"People are calling 911 when they are having one of their worst days of their lives," he said. "So if I can help alleviate the emergency they're experiencing, it's something I'm willing to put my time and effort into."

When he first moved to the area, he went to the fire station to see if he met the requirements to become a volunteer firefighter. Davis then participated in a training program to learn the basic skills and has been volunteering with the department ever since.

"Being a firefighter has allowed me to see all the different types of people and places that the community college serves," he said. "After my regular day job is done, it allows me to extend my service to people in need."

During the COVID-19 pandemic, he also volunteered his time by working in conjunction with the Galveston County Health District to administer vaccines at the mass clinic.

In addition to his work as a professor, Davis brings all this valuable experience to his role as the Public Service Careers Department Chair at College of the Mainland. He works with faculty to prepare students for public service jobs in law enforcement, fire academy, criminal justice and EMS programs. He also helps the department reach its student success goals in recruitment, retention and completion, which he believes further enhances COM as well as its surrounding communities.

"We take people that have a heart for service and train them in a way that allows them to spend their lives helping their communities," Davis said. "Students can have a career where they support their families, make a good living and also do fulfilling work that helps other people." And this is the kind of personalized approach that students can expect as part of the COM experience.

"My favorite thing about College of the Mainland is the unrelenting commitment to student success," Davis said. "I have students that have transferred from other colleges and they tell me that the COM student experience takes them in, helps them out and supports them throughout their degree pathway."

As a communications theory professor, he reviews communication methodologies and research while also showing students skills that will help them across all professional settings.

"Particularly in Public Speaking, I teach students how to stand confidently in front of an audience and really tap into an amazing source of leadership power that will help them in their careers," he said.

Davis does not want his classes to simply fill up spaces on a student's transcript. He strives to teach in a way that has a direct and lifelong impact on his students' career and leadership goals.

"When students come into my class, I want it to pay for itself over and over," he said.

This is why it is so rewarding when former students check in and he sees how he has helped them achieve their goals.

"When they come back and say I went to that college or nursing school or I wasn't sure about the public speaking stuff, but now I'm using it all the time in my job, that's probably the most rewarding payoff that I can get."

COM PROFESSOR MAKES AN IMPACT

N THE CLASSROOM AND IN THE COMMUNITY

Not many college professors choose to volunteer their time to the community by moonlighting as firefighters. Then again, San Leon Fire Captain and COM Communications Theory Professor Dr. R.E. Davis is far from your average professor.

In his case, being active in the community gives him a different perspective that he brings to his role as a professor, allowing him to be more in tune with the students he seeks to serve.

"I think it has given me a greater level of empathy and understanding for my students, the communities they're from and how to reconstruct my classes to meet their needs where they are." Ultimately, Davis believes that the supportive atmosphere at College of the Mainland is a key factor in why his students excel in class and beyond.

"There's something about COM in particular that builds loyalty and trust within our community," he said. "I think students understand that the professors are there to take care of them, to make sure they succeed and to help them in any way possible."



"Once you can get in the high school and meet the kids, the only thing that matters is that relationship," Brown said. "Teachers want to know they will be passing along their students to someone who will invest the same time into their future that they did, and they know that now because of the relationships we've built."

Through a collaborative effort with COM Theatre's design team, the program has consistently won national awards through the **Kennedy Center American College Theater** Festival (KCACTF), beating out colleges from around the country. More recently, Brown was recognized as the Educator of the Year in Higher **Education by the Texas Educational Theatre** Association, Inc. which celebrates theatre educators and their meaningful contributions.

"Although it's not why I do what I do, it's nice when other people notice how hard you've been working," he said.

But for Brown, the true mark of success goes far beyond awards and accolades. As he explains,



"We call ourselves the COM Theatre family because we're teachers for a while, but mentors for life," Brown said. "We are here for our students and their individual journey."

Whether it's a high school student beginning their college journey or a seasoned adult learner discovering a new passion for acting, Brown works diligently to ensure that the College of the Mainland Theatre program offers a comprehensive curriculum to serve all students by tailoring the learning experience to each student's individual needs. And this tailor-made approach is evident through the personalized care and highly specialized resources that students receive from the moment they walk in the door.

The program offers its students an array of courses and services to support them as they refine their craft. From stage combat skills certification classes and musical theatre dance training to website development and headshot services, Brown is committed to nurturing student talent as they prepare to enter the thriving performance industry.

"I get really excited about those 'aha!' moments where



they lock in on a concept suddenly," Brown said. "I love seeing the trajectory of their talent and the growth is immense."

And in terms of growth, the transformation doesn't only lie within the talent of students.

Because of the exponential growth of the program and to better serve the needs of students and the community, College of the Mainland will soon be welcoming in a newly renovated Fine Arts Building which is slated for completion this spring. Made possible through the 2018 bond program, the building is a welcome upgrade for students and the community alike. Some of the building's special features include a new black box training/performance space, a dedicated classroom for technical theatre and theatre appreciation courses, larger dressing rooms and a firsttime green room.

"We'll be able to do more studio shows for our students." and we'll do the summer musical and our season opener in the new space," Brown said.

While the transformation Brown has seen during his tenure has been immense, he looks forward to seeing what the next chapter holds for COM Theatre. As for his students, Brown's ultimate measure of success is seeing his students transform into their best selves, not only as thespians, but most importantly as people.

"We train people on how to be better human beings. Collaborative, empathetic, generous human beings."







LEARN ABOUT COM BOND 2023!

Q: Would the proposed tax increase be effective immediately?

A: No. The tax impact on voters is gradual, as bonds are sold over time to fund the phased construction projects.

Q: I am a senior citizen in the COM taxing district. Will my taxes go up because of this bond?

A: Property taxes are not affected for residents 65 and older (or disabled) if the appropriate homestead exemptions are filed.

Q: How can bond funds be used?

A: Funds received through bonds may be used on various capital projects including new construction, renovations, facilities/technological enhancements, etc. They may not be used toward salaries, operational expenses or other maintenance costs.

Q: Would this bond cause an increase in student tuition?

A: No! We're proud to say that we have not increased student tuition in more than 12 years, and the passage of this bond would not change that.
